Parent Teacher Appointments



SUBJECT IN FOCUS - ENGLISH

English teachers have been working in Grade Teams to develop scope and sequences to ensure each grade is covering a breadth of learning opportunities across the three strands of Literature, Literacy and Language. This also involves matching our current texts and resources to the Australian Curriculum document.

Students in some classes from Grades 7-9 have been trialling a new online program called *WordFlyers* which is closely aligned to the strands of Literacy and Language. *WordFlyers* aims to develop skills in grammar, reading, comprehension, vocabulary and writing, using differentiated activities and a range of high-interest texts.

This is what some students in Mrs Bodell's Grade 9 English class had to say after just one lesson trying *WordFlyers*.


Lilliana: *I enjoyed that if you got stuck it would give you hints. I also enjoyed that if you got it wrong you could do it again to get 100%.*



Callum: *I liked the variety of questions and the different levels for those questions.*





GRADE 7 ENGLISH (Mr McDougall)

Picture books are one of the text types studied in English in every grade. *Fox*, written by Margaret Wild and illustrated by Ron Brooks, is a Grade Seven text which enables students to analyse stylistic devices such as use of colour, page layout, font and language. Students then attempt to create either a prologue or epilogue to the story using similar techniques to the original.

Remember me please.




Melinda is co-founder of the Grassroots Campaigning Movement, Collective Shout; for a world free of sexploitation, exposing corporations, advertisers and marketers who objectify women and sexualise girls to sell products and services.




EQUESTRIAN

Well done Bella, great riding!




WORLD VISION COIN LINE
