From the Principal

Dear Parents and Families,

Welcome to Term Three. It has been great to see students return to school with enthusiasm this week and settle back into good routines very quickly. I hope that students and families have enjoyed the break and made the most of the opportunity to enjoy some family time and recreation.

We have 10 weeks of valuable learning time ahead of us this term and looking ahead on our school calendar the term promises to be a busy time. This term includes our Grade 10 Exams in Week 7 and 8, followed by Arts Week in the second last week of term.

Last Friday our team of students and staff returned from the ski trip to Falls Creek and it was great to hear that the group had an enjoyable and fun week with many learning some new skills and taking up new challenges. My thanks to Miss Hall for her fantastic co-ordination of this trip and to the staff team who so willingly supported this experience in school holiday time.



It was great to receive a letter from the Regional Development Authority acknowledging the wonderful participation of our students in the NextGen Challenge late last term. We were given very positive feedback about both the standard and presentation of ideas. Our students have also been commended for demonstrating great team work and innovation which contributed to their success in the competition. Well done to the students involved; you have been great ambassadors for our school.

Celebrating Student Success

In the coming weeks we will be recognising the progress, efforts and achievements of our students following the mid-year report. After a review of the way we celebrate and acknowledge success and achievement where we have collected feedback from students, staff and parents, we have made a number of changes to our approach. We will be holding a special morning tea for each grade where we will recognise students who have demonstrated outstanding effort through their mid-year report. This occasion will replace the Letters of Commendation and highlights the value we place on effort demonstrating the important role that perseverance and a Growth Mindset play in the learning process. On Friday 18th August our whole school assembly will celebrate outstanding academic achievement from the mid-year reports and will recognise students from each grade. We are looking forward to having parents come along to these events. Invites to the morning teas and our upcoming assembly will be coming home in the mail in the next few days and we strongly encourage parents to attend and be involved in these important celebrations of student learning.

Capital Works

I am very pleased to be able to share with you that ARTAS have been appointed as the architects for our Capital Works Project. ARTAS have extensive experience in working in the education sector having successfully completed redevelopments in a range of schools in recent years. ARTAS are currently meeting with us to build a detailed knowledge of our school context, culture and unique needs and in coming weeks a draft master plan will be developed. While there is a long journey ahead of us, this is a very exciting time for Riverside High School and we look forward to a close working relationship with ARTAS through this important process.

Road Safety

With the start of another new term, it is timely to remind students of the importance of safe travel to and from school. We have had feedback from a number of concerned parents and motorists that some students are crossing West Tamar Road on the highway and putting themselves at huge risk. Can I please ask parents to stress the importance of using the underpass and the traffic lights? West Tamar Road is an extremely busy highway especially at peak times, so your support with reinforcing these important safety messages would be appreciated.

Professional Learning (Student Free Day)

On Monday staff began the term with a Professional Learning Day. This was a great opportunity for staff to work collaboratively on a number of our priority areas. Our morning session had a literacy focus where we are continuing to work on strategies to support the teaching of writing in all subjects areas. Staff also spent time working in subject teams undertaking collaborative planning and developing scope and sequences aligned to the Australian Curriculum. Some photos from this very productive day are included.

Education Act Commences

The new Education Act 2016 commenced during the school holidays, with a staged process for the changes now underway. The Act has been shaped by input from education stakeholders, with two years of consultation. As we work through the various changes, I will share information with you in our newsletter. Our article this week focuses on attendance. As you would be aware this is a high priority for us as a school and we are continually working on addressing any attendance issues and providing high levels of support to ensure all students are attending school. Under the Education Act there is now a new limited set of circumstances where a student can be authorised to be absent from school. I would encourage you to read that attached article which provides further details of these changes.

In Closing

A reminder that Parent Teacher Evenings are scheduled for next week and will be on Monday 31st July 3:30-5:00pm and Tuesday 1st August 3:30-6:30pm. These are an invaluable opportunity to have conversations with teachers following the mid-year report and we encourage as many parents as possible to come along. Please be aware that you will need to use the online booking system to make your appointments (details of how to do this was included with reports).

Next week we have a number of in-school performances coming up with visits from Bell Shakespeare for Grade 9 and 10 and the Tasmanians of the Year as guest speakers, who will be talking to Grade 10 students. Next Friday our whole school will attend the Launceston College Production of *In the Heights*. The show will explore many relevant themes and promises to be a great cultural experience for students.

Attendance Matters: Changes to Student Attendance

<u>Did you know</u> that attending school every day has a big impact on how well your child goes at school.

Missing school for whatever reason has a negative impact on students' learning. Because of this, the new Education Act specifies the reasons a child can be authorised not to attend school.

It is important that you discuss why your child is absent from school with the School Principal or a staff member as soon as practicable.

Why is this change important?

The changes to being authorised not to attend school will help address absenteeism, which has been a longstanding issue in Tasmania. The changes to student absences:

- Encourage regular school attendance to help your child to make steady progress with their learning and gain the skills and knowledge needed for success both now and later in life.
- Help your child see themselves as a valuable and enthusiastic member of their classroom with high expectations of their own potential.
- Help you to emphasise to your child the value and importance of their education.
- Ensure there is a consistent statewide approach to authorised absences across all Tasmanian schools.

When can my child be authorised not to attend school?

Reasons your child can be authorised to be absent include:

- Sickness/incapacity
- Medical, legal or related appointments
- Natural disaster or extreme weather preventing your child from safely attending their enrolled school
- Terminal illness of an immediate family member
- Bereavement of a person your child had a close, significant or family relationship with
- Having witnessed or been subjected to family violence
- Being a participant or official at a recognised National or International sporting, academic or cultural event
- An application for home education being received by the Education Registrar and provisional registration being granted.

What will happen if my child is absent for a reason that isn't listed?

- The absence will be recorded as an unauthorised absence.
- Principals receive notifications about the number of unauthorised absences your child has.
- Your child's school may send you a letter notifying you of the number of unauthorised absences your child has.
- They will seek to work with you to increase your child's attendance to maximise their learning if the Principal is concerned about your child's attendance.

What happens if my family go on holiday during school term?

- Schools have always encouraged family holidays to be planned for during the scheduled school holiday breaks.
- If your family decides to take a holiday during school term, you are encouraged to discuss your plans with the Principal or your child's teacher.
- Penalties will not apply if an absence is explained.

Where can I get more information?

- If you want your child to attend school but need help to do this, your child's school would really like to talk to you about what help you need.
- Please contact your child's school for more information.

SUBJECT IN FOCUS - MEDIA STUDIES AND SHORT FILM MAKING

Among the creative option subjects on offer at Riverside High School, Grade 9 and 10 students have the opportunity to take part in Media Studies and Short Film Making.

Media Studies is a half year course and students are able to explore their interests across the many facets of the changing environment

As a class, the focus is on creating content for others to consume.

Students work on a variety of mediums including blogging, photography, video, audio and embracing the new media such as social media.

One of the highlights of the Media Studies class during the first semester was Lucas Walker's passion for the Tour de France and the podcast he created. Lucas curates an Instagram account, posting images and news for the iconic cycling race and decided to produce a podcast to compliment this. In the lead up to the event he recorded stage previews and rider profiles. As the Tour was staged, Lucas released a podcast every day and ABC Northern Tasmania played each episode as part of their Drive program.

In first term, students were given the opportunity to enter a Department of Education competition to coincide with the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence. The challenge was to create a still image or a 15 second video encouraging the community to take a stand against bullying. Anna Roberts and Oliva Street's image was awarded as one of the prize winners for 2017.

City Park Radio runs a program every Thursday afternoon during the four terms called **School's Out**. The 30-minute show is produced and presented by students from different schools around the region. Media students have participated throughout the last ten years including a fantastic rundown of the Antipodeans trip to Cambodia and Vietnam.

Throughout the two terms, students are able to engage in projects of interest to them, expanding their skills in various platforms and learning to use new programs.

The majority of students undertaking the Wednesday Afternoon Short Film Making class do so with the goal of creating a film for the MyState Film Festival. The challenge is to produce a film under five minutes featuring a prescribed item. This year it is a *phone*.

Last year we had a range of entries from Riverside High School. Current Grade 10 students Joel Parkinson, Sienna Cook, Mia Deans and Jessica Faulkner were the winners of the "Best Use of Feature Item" category at the awards in December for their film *The Ritual*.

During Term Two, learning the skills of stop animation was the focus for some Short Film Making students. Finn Zehntner's use of Lego and other available resources has seen his ideas and hard work turn into several minutes of film. Isaac Askin's Lego Batman film, complete with sound effects, was enjoyed by the class when the final product was shown at the end of last term.

Student work in the media based subjects at school is regularly presented in class and school assemblies. We look forward to seeing what the creative minds of our students create in the second half of the year.

- Undertake engaging activities


When: Monday, 28 August to Friday, 1 September Time: 10am – 2pm (4 hours)

Hi, Taylor Fogg and Tom Meyer here. We are your 2017 Fundraising and Publicity Prefects for 2017.

Our role as the Fundraising and Publicity Prefects is to provide the school with the fundraising opportunities such as: barbecues, free-dress days and small activities that require small gold coin donations. Free Meningococcal W Vaccination Program for Years 10, 11 and 12

The Tasmanian Government is funding a free meningococcal W Vaccine for teenagers aged 15-19 years.

The program will commence during Term Three 2017 and run until 30 April 2018 and will be delivered at your school.

The vaccine provides protection against four strains of meningococcal disease (ACWY) and is given as a single dose.

Meningococcal disease is a rare but severe bacterial infection that can cause lifelong disability or death and can affect people at any age.

Meningococcal bacteria are carried in the nose and throat of some healthy people and are spread through close prolonged contact. The bacteria are more commonly found in teenagers and young adults. Adolescents are at increased risk of meningococcal disease

Meningococcal W has increased significantly across Australia from 2014 onwards. In Tasmania, cases more than tripled in 2016 compared with previous years. Tasmania has a higher rate of meningococcal W disease than other states. Meningococcal W is now the most common meningococcal strain in Tasmania.

You will receive further information and a consent form during term three. Please complete the consent form and return to your school.
