From the Principal

Dear Parents and Families,

It is hard to believe that we are already half way through another term. With lots happening on our school calendar in the remainder of Term 3, a highlight this week has been the chance for 65 students from Grade 7-10 to participate in our Rock Music Workshops for 2 days. This provides students with the opportunity to form a band and work together focusing on developing vocal, instrumental and ensemble skills along with learning song writing and technical expertise. Drama students from Grades 8-10 have also enjoyed the Newstead College production of Wizard of Oz providing both the experience of enjoying the theatre and an authentic learning opportunity that is connected to the Drama program.

Visiting a variety of classrooms this week, I have enjoyed some great discussions with students about their current learning and been impressed by the way students are focused on their work. Our classrooms consistently have a strong sense of purpose and engagement. Grade 10 have their exams approaching and I know students are very busy preparing for these and applying both the study techniques and exam tips that the Grade 10 team are discussing with students to support this important time.



Health and Safety Tips

At this time of year when lots of people unfortunately do have colds and the flu, we are encouraging students to take steps to look after themselves and others. Our school is a large place with a big population and your support in minimising the spread of germs and infection helps everyone to stay fit and healthy! We are also aware of the need to take steps to avoid spreading any risks with meningococcal disease. We have discussed the following tips with students:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water or use a hand sanitizer
- Cover your mouth when coughing or sneezing
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth
- Avoid sharing drinks with others
- If you are unwell please stay home from school so that you can recover and you don't pass your illness onto others.

In school 'Property Damage'

Riverside High School community has a whole school expectation for respecting and caring for school environment including facilities and resources. Our whole school approach involves staff and students regularly discussing and acknowledging the positive and responsible decision making and behaviours in relation to caring for and respecting our school environment and facilities. We are very fortunate that our students care about our school environment and are generally very responsible in looking after our facilities and equipment. However, unfortunately there are times when damage occurs and sometimes this is deliberate. We have developed a school policy in collaboration with the School Association which outlines a process whereby students would be expected to take responsibility for deliberate damage that is caused. This includes a minimum fee of 50% or the full cost of any damage under \$50.00. Any incident would always be investigated thoroughly and communicated to parents, but it is important that you are aware of this policy and the responsibility that students have. We understand of course, that accidental damage can happen and this would not incur a cost.

NAPLAN ONLINE - TRIAL OF THE NEW ONLINE ASSESSMENT PLATFORM

You may have heard that NAPLAN online is being introduced across Australia over three years from 2017. Tasmanian Government schools will be administering NAPLAN online from 2019. Our school has opted to trial the new assessment platform (the computer system the test will be taken on) and assess our readiness to participate in NAPLAN Online from 2019. This trial is called the School Readiness Test (SRT). The SRT is not a test of student achievement and results will **not** form part of a student's overall assessment.

Next week a group of Year 8 and 10 students will participate in the NAPLAN school readiness test. The two tests will take approximately 45 minutes each to complete. NAPLAN online will provide better assessment, more precise results and faster turnaround of information.

Participating in this trial is important as it will help us ensure we have adequate internet connectivity, and whether students have access to sufficient number of devices for NAPLAN testing. During the trial, our school will have the opportunity to practice managing the classroom logistics for an online assessment and the new test administration processes.

Feedback from our school participating in the trial will inform transition to the online assessment as well as provide valuable feedback to shape the final development of the NAPLAN online platform. If you have further questions, please contact our school on 6327 6333.

SUBJECT IN FOCUS - COMPUTERS AND INFORMATION

Information Technologies at Riverside High has introduced students to new exciting and invigorating projects for interactive, engaging and authentic learning. It has allowed students to express themselves, as well as achieve their personal goals and develop essential skills needed for the careers of tomorrow and the new digital age.

Year 9 and 10 students have been engaged in using Arduino computer kits that have allowed for an interactive learning experience. Students have been making, tinkering, and exploring physical and digital interaction. Students were introduced to the foundations of programming, electronics, and mechanics through a series of playful experiments.

The Year 9 and 10 class have been learning the components of a digital computer system - developing their knowledge and understanding of computer hardware by creating their own gaming PC and pitching their creation to the class. They have been using GameMaker and Scratch to develop their critical thinking skills, knowledge in algorithms and developed a working video game with the possibility of publishing through the GameMaker/Scratch website. Students are currently working with the Adobe suite creating high end graphic work and mastering the tools used by professional graphic designers. Students have been saying;

"I'm really enjoying creating interactive electrical devices using Arduino and coding them to do cool things."

"ICT gives me valuable software skills that I can use either in the work place or throughout life."

"I really liked to create a game from scratch that people can play and enjoy."

Grade 8 students have worked with Photoshop to alter digital images to suit needs. One application of note was to create a postcard by "Photo shopping" themselves into a background to make an image that seems as though they were really there on that holiday! Another was to create "Spot the Difference" images where Photoshop editing skills were required to add, remove, morph and colour change elements of their graphic.


For Grade 8 students, their Computational Thinking skills have been developed through coding small robots, the Bebras Computational Thinking Challenge as well as coding games using the Scratch environment on-line from MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology).





GRADE 10 EXAMS

Exam information for students and parents: How much do exams count?

The exams will constitute a major assessment task and this will be the common message given to Grade 10 students by all their teachers. All subject areas will assess the exams utilising A to E criterion based ratings which are linked to achievement standards and described clearly in rubrics. In order to alleviate anxiety, students who feel that their exam result is not indicative of their true ability will have the opportunity to individually negotiate with teachers in order to upgrade their marks. This may include the opportunity to sit retests or complete assignments which specifically target potential areas of improvement as identified by the exam.

All exam papers will be assessed and feedback will be returned to students by the end of Term 3. Students will be afforded an opportunity to look at their exam papers prior to their collection and storage by teachers. Feedback sheets/rubrics will be kept by students.

Learning areas which have conducted exams will dedicate the first two weeks of Term 4 to supporting students to reflect upon their exam performance, reteaching key concepts and providing explicit and targeted interventions which enhance student learning.

Exam tips: these tips have been extracted from the 'Exam Tips booklet' given to all Grade I 0's earlier this term.

Managing your Time and Helping your Brain to Hold Onto Information

Making a study timetable can be very helpful to your revision. Plan what you are going to do each night and then how you are going to use your time effectively. This will help you to make sure that you get everything done.

Eg: Monday night = Write summary on novel's main themes

Tuesday night = Write summary of Science notes on photosynthesis

Here are some ways to assist your brain to retain information in an exam:

- Refine your existing summaries so that they get smaller.
- Test yourself to see if you can say or write the information from the summary without looking
- Have someone else test you
- Teach or explain the information to someone else
- Use word games to help you hold onto information. Pretend you needed to remember some vital rates for History, for instance, and they were: Infant Mortality Rate, Life Expectancy at Birth, Access to Safe Water and Gross Domestic Product, you could create a little saying out of these names to help you remember them in exams. Instead of remembering this list, you could make up a silly phrase like 'I love getting A's' and remember that the first letter in every word of that phrase stands for one of the rates.
- Write essays based on your summaries. Time yourself and stick to exam conditions.
- Complete sample questions or problems (especially in subjects like Maths).
- Ask teachers for help if you find that you do not understand any information.
- Studying with a friend and testing each other can work really well, as long as you do not distract one another and end up chatting!
- Before you walk into an exam, you should have tested yourself a number of times on the key information and be sure that you
 know it.
